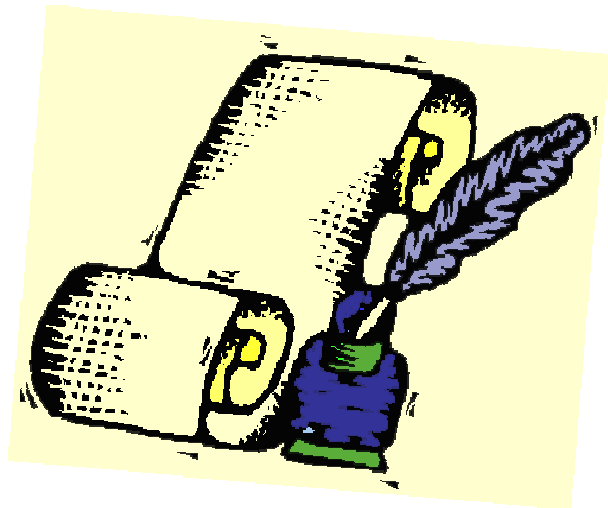

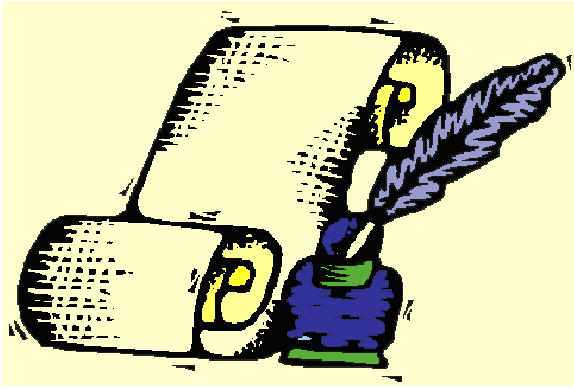

Putting Off Till Tomorrow

When it comes to the creation of a Last Will & Testament, one must conclude that the vast majority of Americans subscribe to the adage, “never do today what can be put off until tomorrow.”

In fact, every year as many as seventy to eighty percent of adult Americans who die, do so without having let their own voice be heard in the form of their personal Will.

As a result, family, friends and loved ones deal with the reality that the state will determine a number of very personal issues. Where there is no Will, all decisions with respect to estate distribution—and even custody of minors—will be made by the court. Given this somewhat startling statistic, one cannot keep from wondering why so many fail to take advantage of all that a Will makes possible.

Too Busy Living To Think About Dying

This may well be the single biggest reason so many Americans die without having prepared a valid Will. Daily living-- from dawn to way past dark—is so demanding that it seems virtually impossible to think about anything even remotely related to death.

The unfortunate truth is that the lives of children, spouses, and loved ones can often be made miserable because a deceased failed to articulate important specifics.

We're Not Dealing With A Mansion, Here!

Many people look at a modest home and a limited asset portfolio as too small to warrant the time and expense of a Will. This is often a costly assumption.

Even after only a few short years, the value of a home—even shares in a closely held, non-public entity—can increase so much that tax and distribution implications are significant. Values can change quickly as a result of inflationary times. So, even in the case of young couples or estates that are seemingly every modest, a Will minimizes the effect of costs and taxes in the event of an untimely death.

These are just two examples of why so many may postpone the creation of a Will. But no matter what the reason, a little time and thought today can result in significant savings and unnecessary emotional stress later.
