


# Welcome

VIRTUS is especially focused on the prevention of wrongdoing and the promotion of right doing. All parishioners are encouraged to attend a VIRTUS session.

- Attend an initial VIRTUS training session
- Re-certify every five years
- Authorize a criminal background check every five years
- Sign a Code of Conduct

All Faith Formation programs and Catholic schools in the Diocese of Winona implement a safe environment curriculum for our children and youth called *Circle of Grace*, designed by the Archdiocese of Omaha. The goal of the Circle of Grace program is to educate and empower children and young people to actively participate in a safe environment for themselves and others.

# **Catechesis of the Good Shepherd**

3 years old - 5<sup>th</sup> grade Wednesdays 4:15-5:45 pm and 6:15-7:45 pm

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is a Catholic faith formation program; our curriculum is rooted in the Bible, Mass, and the Catechism of the Catholic Church. We utilize Montessori methods to nurture each child's relationship with God while educating them about the pillars of our Church. Children meet in a specially prepared room with materials to aid their learning experience, this room is know as an atrium. Each week children, participate in small group lessons with a trained catechist and assistant catechist, independently work with materials, and engage in prayer time. Catechists participate in a nationally recognized training program to familiarize themselves with the curriculum and learn more about Montessori principles. We offer three levels of CGS.

Level II - preschool & kindergarten Level II - 1<sup>st-</sup> - 3<sup>rd</sup> grade Level III - 4<sup>th</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup> grade

Children's Liturgy of the Word is a celebration of each Sunday's Gospel to help young children understand the Word of God. Children are invited to leave Mass with a catechist during the readings and the homily for an age-appropriate exploration of Scripture in the nursery. All children, ages 3 through first grade, are welcome and encouraged to attend. # **First Reconciliation and First Communion**

2<sup>nd</sup> grade and older

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is a healing Sacrament that offers us an experience of God's boundless mercy. It frees us from our own sins but challenges us to have the same compassion and forgiveness for those who sin against us. The Eucharist, like Baptism, is a Sacrament of Initiation where God shares his holiness with us, so that we can share it with the world around us.

We offer preparation for these two Sacraments to everyone in second grade and older through:

- 1. Catechesis of the Good Shepherd
- 2. Kingdom Kids
- 3. Catholic School preparation during their school day

Children and parents from all three programs come together several times a year for community-wide activities. We prepare children for both sacraments beginning in September, traditionally celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation in January and First Eucharist in May. All are welcome!

# Liturgy

Lay Liturgical Ministers include all the people having a role in the Mass who are not an ordained priest, deacon, or bishop. The Mass is the greatest prayer of the Church. We are all called to full, conscious, and active participation in the liturgy. Every person in the assembly is encouraged to respond, sing, pray, and worship with their mind, body, and soul. The lay liturgical ministries are essential elements of the Pax Christi Masses. The scheduling of lay liturgical ministers is done through an online software program. It is easy to request a substitute and there are plenty of opportunities for those who prefer not to serve regularly, but would like to sub occasionally.

**Altar Servers** assist the priest during Mass. This ministry is open to ages 5<sup>th</sup> grade through adult. A 1½ hour training is offered once or twice a year. \*\* **Especially Needed!** \*\*

**Cross Bearers** lead the procession, carrying the crucifix into and out of church for weekend Masses. It is preferable for cross bearers to be vested with a white alb, sit with the altar servers, and hold the Roman Missal for the priest during Mass.

**Environment Committee** meets periodically to evaluate the worship space of the church and coordinate the decorating of the environment for liturgies throughout the year. Help is also needed with the Christmas and Easter decorating - no need to be on the committee!

# **Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion**

distribute the Blessed Sacrament to the faithful during Mass. Some EMHCs also take Holy Communion to the sick and homebound. You can become part of this ministry as a confirmed Catholic who has a reverence for the Mass and is in good moral standing in the community. Training is offered once or twice a year. If needed, it is easy to request a substitute.

**Gift Bearers** carry up the bread and wine at the Offertory. To schedule ahead of time, contact Fran in the church office or you can volunteer by speaking with an usher 10-15 minutes prior to Mass. This is a wonderful and easy ministry for two or more people of all ages, especially families.

**Hospitality Ministries** are essential for a welcoming faith community. Greeters and Ushers are scheduled on a team which serves every weekend for one month and then is off for two months. Hospitality Room Hosts are scheduled once every four weeks. It is easy to request a sub for any Hospitality Ministry position and you may also sign up to be an occasional "substitute" if you'd rather not be regularly scheduled.

- **Greeters** welcome parishioners at the doors with a smile.

  After Mass these ministers distribute bulletins. This is ideal for families who wish to serve together. No experience necessary and you may sign up at any time!
- Hospitality Room Hosts are available after Masses to assist with registering new parishioners and answering questions regarding the Pax Christi faith community. This is an easy and fun ministry, which only takes about 15 minutes. Signing up to be an occasional substitute Host is also warmly welcomed. This is a particularly good ministry for someone who has been an active member of Pax for many years and would enjoy sharing their love of this parish family with others
- **Ushers** assist in seating the congregation, arrange for gift bearers to bring up the bread and wine, assist with passing baskets for the offertory collection, and handle any minor issues that may occur.

**Linen Washers** A special (but not difficult) procedure is required when washing and ironing the white altar linens. Commitment is weekly for a month, usually two months of the year.

**Liturgy Committee** is responsible for evaluating the liturgies at Pax Christi and making recommendations to enhance the spiritual enrichment of the Masses. The Liturgy Committee meets periodically for ongoing liturgical education and discussion.

# Liturgy

**Livestream** If you can navigate a smartphone, you can livestream our Mass for people to watch on YouTube. Training provided.

**Mass Readers** have the important ministry of proclaiming the Word of God, reading the first or second reading, and can also read the universal prayer intentions in the absence of the Deacon. A short training is offered to help you prepare for this beautiful ministry.

**Projectionists** are our technical angels who help us to run the slide show during Mass so that the faithful can easily follow along during the Liturgy. The slide show is prepared for you in advance, you need only click through the slides at the right time with the help of notes that's are provided. It is an easy service that requires very little training!

**Sacred Vessel Cleaners** Special care is taken when washing the chalices and other Mass items. Volunteer weekly, periodically, or on a substitute basis. It only takes about 15 minutes after Mass.

**Sacristans** choose to help in one of two services: either by arriving prior to the Mass to help set things up for the Liturgy or by offering their services to clean vessels following the Mass. They help the Liturgist in assuring that everything that is needed for Mass is set up properly for Father. Many sacristans are needed to fill the schedule so that everything goes smoothly on the weekends. A short training is provided for those who are interested in this noble service!

# **Music Ministry**

Cantors lead the congregation in prayer through the singing of various Mass parts. Cantors should have a good singing voice and the ability to lead the faithful in effective participation.

**Instrumentalists** are welcome!

**Choirs** lead the congregation in singing. Our goal is to enhance our liturgies with music and to have active participation from the congregation at our weekend and Holy Day liturgies.

## Help Us Ensure Our Legacy

Planned Giving encompasses a variety of ways that gifts can be made. It usually involves financial or estate planning; however, it is not reserved only for the wealthy.

Planned giving is a means by which anyone concerned with the wise use of their personal resources makes a considered choice about their ultimate disposition.

# **Planned Giving**

- Establishes a way to provide for family members while remembering the church
- Often enables the donor to provide more for his or her heirs and to make a larger gift than thought possible
- Often reduces taxes
- Can be designated for general funds or endowment
- Is either an outright gift or a deferred gift.

## Bequest in a Will

Can be a:

- Set amount of money
- Percentage of the estate or a specific asset
- Trust or naming the church as a contingent beneficiary

#### **Life Income Gifts**

Life income gifts provide you or your designated beneficiary income for life in exchange for your gift.

The most common types:

#### **Pooled Income Fund**

Gifts (\$2,500 gift minimum) are "pooled" with other gifts and invested in a professionally managed investment portfolio. Benefits include:

- Guaranteed income for life, depending on the rate of return on the fund's investments
- Income can also flow to another beneficiary
- Immediate federal income tax deduction, usually based on the age of the donor and/or beneficiaries
- If funded through appreciated securities such as stocks, bonds, or mutual funds, the elimination of capital gains taxes
- Possible reduction in estate taxes

At the death of the final beneficiary, the property goes to your charity.

# Planning for the Future

#### **Charitable Gift Annuity**

Benefits of are similar to that of the pooled income fund with these differences:

- Minimum gift is \$5,000
- Income for life is guaranteed at a fixed amount
- A portion of the gift is deductible
- A portion of the income received is tax exempt

#### **Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust**

- Available to donors giving \$100,000 or more
- Can be funded with various types of assets, including real estate
- Provides income for life, an income tax deduction, relief from capital gains taxes (if funded through appreciated property), and a possible reduction in estate taxes
- Income fluctuates based on the performance of the portfolio

#### **Charitable Lead Trust**

- Enables you to transfer assets to a trust that pays its income to the church for a set period of time
- At the end of the term, the principal and all capital appreciation returns to you or whoever you name.

# **Gifts of Special Assets**

Real estate, securities, and personal property can be gifted to the church. Examples include:

#### **Charitable Life Estate Contract**

- Deed your home, vacation home, farm, ranch, or condominium to the church and retain the right to live on the property and/or receive income from the property for as long as you live
- Receive an income tax deduction and normally avoid any capital gains taxes
- Inheritance and estate taxes may be reduced at the time of your death
- Gifts of appreciated real estate or securities allow you to avoid capital gains taxes, if transferred to the church prior to selling. However, if it has decreased in value, sell the assets before making the gift, establishing a capital loss

## Planning for the Future

#### **Tangible Personal Property**

- Gifts of tangible personal property, such as jewelry, coins, works of art, automobiles, etc. may be donated
- It is your responsibility to set an appraised value of the gift; any gift over \$5,000 must be independently appraised.

#### **Life Insurance**

- Purchase a new policy and make the church the owner and beneficiary of the policy; you may be able to make a much larger gift than otherwise possible
- Make the church the owner and beneficiary, or contingent beneficiary of an existing policy
- Name the church to receive the proceeds if the designated beneficiaries predecease the insured

#### **Retirement Accounts**

The remainder value of many retirement accounts can be heavily taxed when left to friends and family, but pass tax-free to your church upon your death.

We are stewards of God's bounty. Caretakers.
For a brief period we are given time, energy, and resources.
What we do with these gifts ultimately defines the character of our life and the depth of our spiritual understanding.

We encourage you to consult your attorney or financial planner for more information and tax advice on these options.

#### **Parish History**

The history of Pax Christi is not long, as parishes go, but the Pax Christi family has grown both in spirit and in size. We began in June 1973, by decree of Bishop Watters. Father James McCauley was sent to be the pastor developer, and was assigned the daunting task of establishing a new



parish, to be called Pax Christi - the Peace of Christ. While the church was being built, we celebrated Mass at Skate Country, an indoor roller rink; a beginning that's captured in a stained glass window located at the lower parking lot entrance. Ground was broken in July 1974, the rectory was completed by Christmas 1974 and in July 1975, Pax Christi was dedicated.

As the parish continued to grow rapidly from its original 250 families, so did the parish's need for more classrooms and meeting space. Thus, in 1979, the Queen of Peace Hall was built and dedicated. The parish experienced explosive membership growth and, already in 1981, the parish reached its facility design capacity of 750 families. By 1984, Pax Christi numbered 1,000 families. In the late 1980s growth in our northwest section of Rochester accounted for 40% of the growth in the entire city. In 1988, the addition of the Spiritual Center onto the original rectory gave us a chapel and much needed office, meeting, and work space.

Because the parish continued to face an acute shortage of space, the Activity Center in the lower level of the church was constructed in 1993. In 1997, a capital campaign was launched to expand and enhance the gathering and worship spaces. The new rectory was built in 2005 and the former rectory was converted to office and youth space. In June, 2010 we were given an incredible gift, the new Pax Christi Youth Center was dedicated.

March of 2020 brought challenges to the entire world with the COVID-19 pandemic. Stay-at-home orders were in effect so to reach our parishioners we began streaming our daily and weekend Masses on Friday, March 20. Many groups met virtually and we learned how to Zoom and remain socially distant.

Currently, Pax Christi is home to 1600 families. We are a growing, vibrant parish. Welcome home.
